Arthur Green Thursday, October 31 at 1 o'clock. All who are interested are invited to attend.

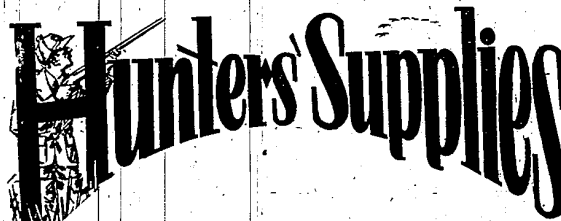
TROUT REARING FAILS

With a few notable exceptions, commercial trout-rearing concerns in Michigan have met with failure or have been abandoned as non-profitable, according to the fish division of the Department of Conservation.

Disease and the high cost of production have discouraged the owners of many of the commercial rearing ponds, it is said, and they have abandoned their projects.

Successful commercial enterprises of this kind have derived much of their income from the sale of eggs, and in some instances, sale of eggs constitutes the larger part of the income.
