ON ROYALTY BASIS

A policy of disposing of all mineral and non-metallic minerals on a royalty basis was adopted by the Conservation Commission at its November meeting.

In the future instead of selling its mineral and non-metallic mineral rights on its own land, which it has disposed of but has reserved these rights, the state will sell on a royalty basis, receiving compensation in proportion to the amount of raw materials taken from the ground.
