Two large plate glass windows were smashed and hundreds of dollars worth of merchandise; stolen by thieves who entered two stores in Clarenceville Wednesday evening.

The two stores entered were the Smith Drug Store and the Atlantic and Pacilic Tea Costore, both facing Grand Riverroad and only a few feet from the heavily-travelled highway.

Deputies William Tamm and Charles Ramsay of Farmington, called to investigate the robbery, reported that the intruders had hurled bricks through the thick plate glass windows. At the And P. store, between 200 and 250 pounds of butter, an adding machine and three cartons of rigarettes were stolen. At the drug store, three dozen rings, ricarettes and cituars valued at \$20. candy valued at \$3, and a flashlight were taken. In each rose the plate glass broken represents a large loss.
