

## Township Board Seeking A Site For Town Hall

**Offer Of Two Acres On Orchard  
Lake Near 13-Mile  
Still Open**

Farmington Township officials are looking about for a site for a new town hall. One site has been offered for consideration, and they will consider others which may be brought to their attention.

Activity toward selecting a location for a Township building spurred on by a statement of former Supervisor Isaac Bond at the meeting of the Township Board Tuesday evening, to the effect that an offer of two acres of a site which he first made

The two acres offered by Mr. Bond is situated on Orchard Lake road, between 13 and 12-Mile roads. Mr. Bond said that he would sign at any time a deed to the Township, with the provision that a Township hall is to be erected there.

Following discussion of the question, it was agreed by members of the Board that the various members would look around for other possible locations, with a view to selecting the best. Supervisor Harry McCracken, said he believed that any proposed

Justice Walter Headerle suggested that a location near the town of Smithton, Pa., be selected.

Ten-Mile and Switzer roads would be the nearest the population center of the Township and that this was more important than the geographical center. He expressed the opinion that eventually the Township would have to build two buildings for voting.
