WILLIAM ALDEN SMITH.
Makes Emphatic Statement Favoring Equal Suffrage.



UNITED STATES SENATOR SMITH

William Alden Smith was born at Dowagiac, Mich., May 12, 1859. In 1872 he removed with his parents to Grand Rapids. Besides a common school education he studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1883. He was honored by Dartmouth college in 1901 with the degree of master of arts. In 1878 he served as page in the house of the state legislature, was elected to congress seven consecutive terms, resigning to take a seat in the United States senate, to which he was elected in 1907 to fill the unexpired term of Senator Alger and also for the ensuing full term.

Senator Smith is positive in his support of woman's suffrage in his home commonwealth. He says: "I am in favor of the constitution. I am in favor of the amendment to be submitted to the Michigan electorate in November proposing equal suffrage. I find no warrant, either in justice or ethics, for discrimination against women on account of sex. I believe the amendment proposed should be adopted and that thereby a vast army of painstaking, patriotic, country-loving, worthy women will be given the privilege in government which they deserve."
