## Interstate LONG DISTANCE TELEPHONE RATES Again Reduced

EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 1930

On calls from points in Michigan to out-of-state points, 60 to 300 miles distant, Station-to-Station day rates are reduced 10% in most cases. For example, the day rate for a station-to-station call from Detroit to Cleveland is reduced from 70c to 60c; from Grand Rapids to Chicago 85c to 75c; from Jackson to Fort Wayne, Indiana 65c to 55c; from Lansing to Cincinnati, Ohio \$1.30 to \$1.20; from Marquette to Milwaukee, Wisconsin \$1.25 to \$1.15; from Saginaw to Toledo, Ohio 85c to 75c; from Kalamazoo to Indianapolis, Indiana \$1.05 to 95c.

This is the fourth reduction in long distance rates within little more than three years. The present reduction will result in a saving of more than \$5,000,000 a year to telephone users of the United States.

## TALKING PICTURE OF TIGER-HUNTING TO BE SHOWN AT THE SHUBERT

The "talkies" have invaded the jungle!

We are to have the mysteries, thrills and dangers of the strange places brought to our ears as well as to our eyes, now that the

microphone has been joined to the motion picture camera as a part of every explorer's equipment.

"Hunting Tigers in India," made by Commander G. M. Dyott one of the Vernay expeditions of the American Museum of Natural History, is to introduce this new type of entertainment to this vicinity, according to announcement of the management of the Shubert Detroit Opera House in Detroit. It is the first of a series of six full length entertainments to be brought to the theatres this season by Talking Picture Epics, Inc., an or-

ganization of capitalists interested in big game hunting, exploration and scientific investigation, most of whom were members of the company responsible for the exhibition of "Simba," the Mr. and Mrs. Martin Johnson picture which revived interest in travel and adventure film in America.

"Hunting Tigers in India" comes to Detroit for a short engagement beginning Sunday afternoon, January 12, and will be exhibited twice daily. The voice of Commander Dyott will be heard throughout the exhibition of the picture, explaining and

commenting upon its various sequences. In addition to the tiger hunts, in one of which the slaying of three of these jungle destroyers is shown, there are views of a rogue elephant hunt, the only known motion pictures of the one-horned rhino in its native habitat, close-ups of religious ceremonies of various sects in India, where every third day is devoted to religious observances; torture, self-inflicted by penitents; great herds of both wild and tame elephants, and many other unusual and interesting camera and microphone shots.
