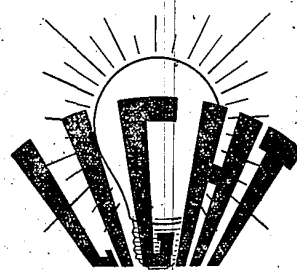
Busy Telephone Day
