MICHIGAN DEATHS IN TRAFFIC ON INCREASE

Michigan's traffic deaths are increasing, according to a report issued yesterday by the Detroit Automobile Club. Wayne County, exclusive of Detroit, lead all other counties of the State for the first 11 months of 1929 in its increase of traffic accidents with a total of 137 fatalities, or an increase of 34 per cent.

Oakland County showed an increase from 61 to 79 deaths in 1929, as compared with 1928.

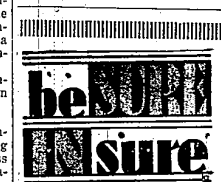
"Other speakers who participated were, Nedra Jones, Gwendolyn Jones, Margaret Blair and Marion Keast."

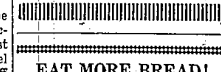

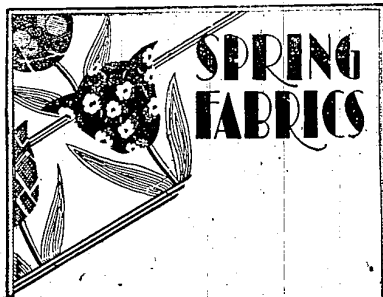
