Regular meeting of the Commissioners of the City of Farmington, held February 3, 1930. Called to order by Mayor Lamb at 7:45 p. m.

Commissioners present: Hat-ton, Goers, Staman, Otis, Gildemeister and Hogle.

Minutes of the meeting of January 20 read and approved.

The Clerk read a communication from the Township Board instructing the City Commissioners to name a committee to confer with the former in regard to the Town Hall matter at a meeting to be held at the Warner Dairy Co. office February 6, 1930.

Motion made by Otis, seconded by Hogle, that a committee of three be appointed. Carried. Mayor Lamb named the entire membership as a body.

A petition was received from the Legislative Committee of the Woman's Club asking that the name Gill Street be changed to Quaker Road. If no objection is made within 30 days it will be so ordered.

Moved by Gildemeister, seconded by Hogle, that the Mayor be authorized to purchase such equipment. Carried.

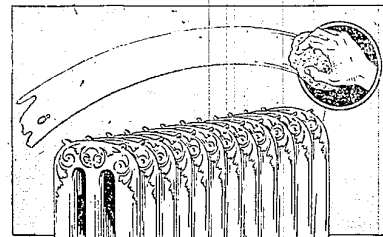
### WARREN EARL ROACH
