

**Petitions Ask That Crawford Be Named**

I am thinking of," went on Mr. Gullen, "We know Mr. Crawford. He is highly respected by the townspeople and he is highly respected among educators.  
"As a matter of fact, in view of the circumstances and the feeling of the community for Mr. Crawford, I do not see how this Board can refuse to appoint him. There is another element, too, and that is the matter of taxes. We could give Mr. Crawford a very substantial increase over his current salary, and still it would be less than we would probably have to pay a new man coming in. Mr. Crawford has been here for over four years. He knows the school, and the people know him. I believe that in our present circumstances, he is just the man to take hold of our school system at this moment and lead us to the kind of school we want. And I again move now that this Board tender Mr. Crawford a contract as superintendent of schools for next year."

"We will consider the matter in executive session," replied Mrs. Roos. "And everyone else will be excused, except Mr. Baker." But the four Board members present, and Supt. Baker, left the room.

At the executive session, the vote to eliminate any candidate not having a master's degree was 3 to 1. Mr. Gullen voted against the motion, and Mrs. Roos, Mrs. Florence Lee, secretary and Trustee Frank L. Macomber voting for the motion. Trustee Arthur Lamb was not present.

**Many Seek Position**  
Four applicants for the superintendent's position were interviewed by the Board members during the executive session. It is said that more than two dozen applications have been received, a number of men coming to Farmington to see members of the Board.

The meeting of the Board Friday evening was originally scheduled for Monday evening, but was postponed because Trustee Lamb would not have been able to attend Monday night.  
At the suggestion of Mrs. Lee, who made the audit report appearing in another column of this issue, the first few minutes of the Board's session were kept open to the press, while the report was made.

The petitions read as follows:  
"WE, the undersigned electors, residents and parents of school children of Farmington District No. 5, do hereby respectfully petition your honorable body to promote Principal A. R. Crawford to the position of Superintendent of Public Schools for the next school year, believing him honestly entitled to a trial for the following reasons:  
1. His excellent record during the past four and one-half years, during which his work has been of the highest standard;  
2. His exceptionally high character, which has won him the respect of the community and the affection of students, teachers and townspeople;  
3. His right to a trial in the position—because we believe it only fair that a man of Mr. Crawford's high type, who has served nearly five years in his position, is justly entitled to promotion."

**SUMMER CAMP IS PLANNED ON FARM NEAR FARMINGTON**

Recreation Spot For Workers And Children To Be Built Next Spring

A new summer camp northwest of Farmington is being planned by a Detroit organization, the Workers' Educational Association, which has taken over a farm of 76 acres formerly in charge of the Czecho-Slovak Farm Co-operative Association. The farm is located on the Old Mill road, near 12-Mile and Halsted roads. The Association intends to build a summer camp which will be available to workers and their children at the cost of maintenance, and without return on the investment, it being a non-profit project. A dining-hall, cottages, and a dormitory for children are included in the first year's building plans.

It is expected that building will be started early in March. Bids on the digging of wells and providing material for the new buildings are now being sought. A survey of the acreage is to be made, following which the camp will be laid out. The stream running through the property will be utilized, a dam being planned to provide a lake for swimming.

Joseph Koch will be manager of the new camp, according to the officers of the Association.
