Article Is Offered To Overcome Rumors

(Continued from page one)
Schools, concur in the statements
contained in the annexed news-
paper article.

The article follows:
Superintendent of School, Carl
E. DeMeritt, tendered his resig-
nation to the board of education
at its meeting Monday evening.
Mr. DeMeritt has been connected
with the Mason schools for four
years, one year as principal of
the high school and the past three
years as superintendent. In his
communication to the school
board the superintendent gave his
reasons as follows: "Desiring
larger opportunities for educa-
tional service, I hereby tender my
resignation as your chief execu-
tive officer, to take effect at the
close of the present school year."
The members of the board of
education state that they are
sorry to lose the services of their
superintendent but will not stand
in the way of his opportunities.
They complimented Mr. DeMeritt
upon his many accomplishments
as head of the Mason schools,
among them being the placing of
the school upon a business basis,
the installation of a cost system
to determine the per capita cost
of education in the several de-
partments, the establishment of a
child accounting system, the
building up of an excellent li-
brary to replace the one destroyed
by the disastrous fire of seven
years ago, and the improvement
made in the personnel of the
teaching staff.

Mr. DeMeritt in summing up
his work of the past four years
points to the excellent record of
the eighteen new teachers recom-
mended by him and hired by the
board, stating that each one has
justified his judgment. In speak-
ing of the progress made in the
building up of a school library,
he states that no school of this
size in the state has a finer selec-
tion of books recommended by the
authorities. Since his regime
\$2,750 has been expended upon the
library, which had received but
\$600 previously since the old

building was destroyed. At present
the library contains 1950 vol-
umes and it is expected the total
will go well beyond 2,100 before
the end of the year. In the selec-
tion of these books Mr. DeMeritt
has used great care. He explain-
ed that there are three lists of
school library books accepted as
authoritative. In selecting vol-
umes he first purchased books
included in all three lists. The
American Library Association,
the Michigan Approved list and
the Wilson Company list. When
additional funds were available
books contained in two of the
lists were bought and at the end
of this year the library will con-
tain nearly the complete list rec-
ommended by two or more of the
authorities. Another accomplish-
ment in which the superintendent
has taken pride is the beautifi-
cation of the grounds, the im-
provement at the year of the
building being especially notice-
able.

Mr. DeMeritt is a graduate of
the University of Michigan and
lacks but two summer schools of
having a master's degree. Previ-
ous to coming to Mason four
years ago, he was superintendent
of schools at Camden and before
that, principal of the Saranac
high school. He succeeded Mr.
George Shawley as principal and
with the retirement of Supt. W.
L. Reed, Mr. DeMeritt was ten-
dered that post. Mr. and Mrs. De
Meritt have formed many friend-
ships during their stay in Mason,
the former being very prominent
in church and fraternal circles.
The retiring superintendent
has not announced his future
plans except to say that he has
several openings under consider-
ation.

The board of education an-
nounces that no successor to Mr.
DeMeritt has yet been selected
but that steps will be taken at
once to secure a superintendent.
