"Confidence Lost"

To the Editor:
Are the present majority of the School Board insisting on the right to select the new superintendent without revealing any information concerning the various candidates? Do they feel that the judgment of even the whole Board is of superior quality to that of possibly hundreds of interested parents? With the possibility of bigotry or personal spite affecting the judgment of any of them, do they, for one moment think that we are going to sit by without

inquiring into the why and wherefore of their acts?

School Boards change. Farmington has before it an excellent example of what happens when a superintendent is chosen by a temporary majority of the Board, and a few months later comes in his job under the necessity of working with a different majority—one that did not select him. Isn't the same thing likely to happen here again if the present majority prevails temporarily, against the overwhelming popular opinion?

Let the Board recognize a few facts in regard to the present situation. The public is interested in who shall be selected as superintendent. By their secretiveness the Board has destroyed the confidence of the part of the public as implied in their election to office. If the private statements and publicly expressed opinions attributed to various members of the Board be true, they have laid themselves open to the suspicion that their judgment cannot be otherwise than warped thereby.

When the Board is ready to lay all their cards on the table, then, and not until then, shall we accept at face value their protestations of fairness and sincerity.

Every one knows Mr. Crawford's qualifications and no one outside of Board members has been allowed to acquaint themselves with the qualifications of any other applicant. Further, I must point out that no member of the Board should be allowed to use their official authority in any way that suggests intolerance or to satisfy a personal grudge.

If an appeal is of no avail we can and will resort to recall proceedings. This, of course, is not pleasant to either party, but it is the present attitude of the majority of the Board.

which occurred so frequently that it might well have decided the election for either candidate. Where a voter put a cross behind the name of one candidate for an office, and crossed out the other name, this was held good.

In a number of cases, however, particularly in Precinct No. 1, the voter appeared unable to decide on the candidate he wanted for treasurer, and crossed out both names. This was held to void the ballot, as a distinguishing mark, although the names crossed out were for another office than that of supervisor. Fourteen ballots were thrown out in the Precinct No. 1 alone on this rule.

It was explained that the reason for voiding these ballots, while allowing those on which one name was crossed out, was that the manner of voting many years ago was merely to cross out the name of the candidate not desired.

On Wednesday evening, March 5th, a group of young farmers of the County met with the Oakland County Agricultural Council and discussed the possibility of organizing into a group.

They decided to organize under the head of Junior Farm Bureau. Their purpose being to get better acquainted with each other, their problems and practices. They decided to have group educational meetings with outside speakers and educational meetings trips and be in a position to carry out some worth-while enterprise in connection with their community.

There are quite a number of young fellows in their first year of High School or out of school on farms who are not connected with the older organizations, who need a group of this nature to tie up with and it is hoped this organization will fill the need.

The next meeting is at Walled Lake High School April 8th. Supper will be served at 6:30 with a speaker from the college followed by a short organization meeting winding up the evening with athletics.

NEW YORK WOMAN TO SPEAK MONDAY AT LENTEN CLASS

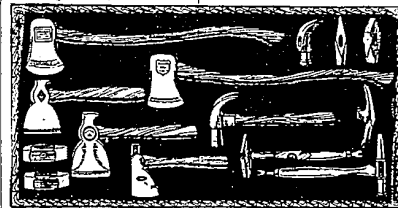
Miss Helen Wallace To Deliver Address At Second Meeting Sponsored By Churches

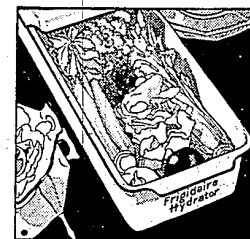
