This letter to you is with regret in as much as you have been a long time Deputy Sheriff in the City of Farmington, but due to the fact that I am going to be a candidate for the coming election and knowing that you are a strong supporter and spending a great deal of your time in campaigning for another candidate, I feel that you are not loyal to this office at the present.

I also feel that in as much as you are a Special Deputy that it must be somewhat embarrassing for you to campaign for some one else and I know that it would be very much embarrassing for you to come in and inform me that you are and that you would like to have your commission revoked. On that account I thought I might possibly relieve you some by informing you that your commission as a Deputy Sheriff is revoked to take effect immediately.

Although, I want you to understand that, that is any man's right to work and vote for whom he sees fit, although I do not think it is proper for you to be on the book as a Special Deputy if you cannot see your way clear to be loyal to this department.

WILLIAM GILLETTE IN SHERLOCK HOLMES IN TO BE AT THE WILSON

Having broken all records for attendance in a score of cities, including New York, Chicago and Philadelphia, William Gillette comes to the Wilson Theatre, Detroit, in his famous creation, "Sherlock Holmes," April 21 in a week's engagement to say farewell to the stage. There will be but one matinee and that on Saturday.

After an absence from the theatre of a dozen years, William Gillette remains, as 30 years ago, the idol of the American stage. Crowding the theatres to capacity every performance, the public has proved to Mr. Gillette that his memory was warm in its heart. Not only is the older generation interested in the farewell performance of the most distinguished actor of his day, but the youngsters also are clamoring to see the idol of their elders. In his audiences are found entire families, ranging in age from six to three-score years and ten.

After all, "Sherlock Holmes" is and has been the ideal detective of every boy and girl since Arthur Conan Doyle began writing his famous stories years ago. Headed allegedly by the names of Senator Hefflin, Bernard Shaw, Arthur Tappan, Charles G. Dawes, Henry Ford and Col. Lindbergh another pestiferous chain letter is making its way over the face of the civilized but suffering globe.

This time it is a letter "started by a railroad officer" asking each recipient to send on to nine friends the message, "Cross Crossings Cautiously."

The nine friends in turn are requested to pass it on to nine more, on the same terms, as part of a worldwide safety first movement. "If any one breaks the chain he is to have hard luck; if he continues it within 24 hours, he will enjoy good fortune in 8 days—or whatever other tomfoolery the latest victim of superstition wishes to include in his letter. It is easy to imagine Bernard Shaw passing on the letter to his enemies with a wicked gleam of mischief in his eye as he reflected what fools those mortals be—if Bernard Shaw ever saw it.

Nothing in the way of penal legislation appears to have been done, so far, against the chain letter pest. The surest way to break its promise of good luck would be to provide hard luck, in the way of a postal law fine, for any individual convicted of starting a chain.—Grand Rapids Press.

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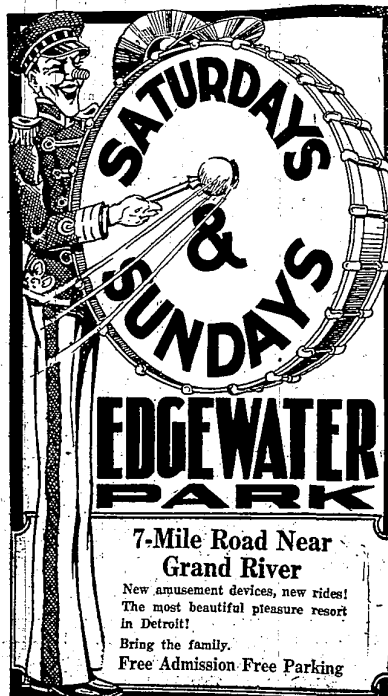
