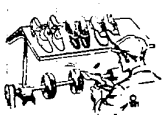


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COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS

Regular meeting of Commissioners of the City of Farmington held June 16, 1930.

Called to order by Mayor Lamb at 8 p. m. Commissioners present: Staman, Hogle, Hatton, Otis, Hogle and Goers.

Minutes of the meeting of June 2 read and approved.

Minutes of the meeting of June 8 read and approved with the following correction:

At a regular meeting of the City Commission of the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, held on the 9th day of June, 1930.

Present: Goers, Otis, Gilde-meister, Staman, Hatton and Hogle.

Absent: None.

Resolution introduced by: Hogle. Supported by Hatton.

WHEREAS, at the special election held in the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, on April 28, 1930, the City was authorized to borrow the sum of Fifty-five thousand dollars (\$55,000) and issue bonds therefor for the purpose of extending and improving the sewer system of the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan.

AND WHEREAS, on May 26th, 1930, the City Commission of the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, received bids for fifty-five thousand dollars (\$55,000) of sewer bonds, with interest not to exceed five per centum (5%) per annum, payable semi-annually, said bonds to be dated May 1, 1930, and to mature as follows: \$2,000 August 1, 1931, and each year thereafter on August first up to and including August 1, 1940, \$3,000 August 1, 1941, and each year thereafter on August first up to and including August 1, 1949; both principal and interest being payable at the office of the City Treasurer of the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan.

AND WHEREAS, bids were received for bonds bearing interest at the rate of four and three quarters per centum (4 3/4%) per annum, and maturing as above set forth, the City Commission of the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, awarded to the highest and best bidder bonds of the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, bearing interest at the rate of four and three quarters per centum (4 3/4%) per annum.

payable semi-annually, and maturing as above set forth, RESOLVED that the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, issue the fifty-thousand (\$50,000) of bonds authorized at the election on April 28, 1930, to bear interest at the rate of four and three quarters per centum per annum, payable semi-annually, dated May 1, 1930, and to mature as follows: \$2,000 August 1, 1931, and each year thereafter on August first up to and including August 1, 1940, \$3,000 August 1, 1941, and each year thereafter on August first up to and including August 1, 1949; and that said bonds be signed on behalf of the City, by Arthur Lamb, its Mayor, and N. H. Power, its City Clerk; and that said semi-annual interest shall be deducted by coupons attached to each of said sewer bonds, which coupons shall be executed by the facsimile signatures of the Mayor and Clerk of said City.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the form of bonds and coupons shall be substantially as follows:

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, that the City of Farmington, a Municipal Corporation, in the County of Oakland, and State of Michigan, acknowledges itself to owe and for value received promises to pay to the bearer the sum of

ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS
lawful money of the United States of America, on the first day of August, 19..... with interest thereon from the date hereof at the rate of four and three quarters (4 3/4%) per centum per annum, payable on the first day of August, 1930, and semi-annually thereafter on February first and August first of each year on presentation and surrender of the annexed interest coupons as they severally become due. Both principal and interest of this bond are hereby made payable at the office of the City Treasurer, in the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, and for the prompt payment of this bond, both principal and interest, the full faith and credit of the City of Farmington are hereby irrevocably pledged.

This bond is one of a series of fifty-five (55) bonds of even date and like tenor, except as to date of maturity, issued under the authority of, and in conformity with the provisions of the Charter of the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, and was authorized by an election held in the City of Farmington on the 28th day of April, 1930. This bond has been issued for the purpose of extending and improving the sewer system of the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan.

It is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions and things required by law or charter to be done precedent to and in the issuance of the series of bonds, of which this is one, in order to make them binding and valid obligations of the said City of Farmington, have been done and performed in regular and due form, as required by law and the provisions of the City Charter, and that the total indebtedness of said City, including the series of bonds of which this is one, does not exceed the Statutory, Charter, or Constitutional limitations.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF the City Commission of the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, has caused this bond to be signed by its Mayor and countersigned by its City Clerk, and the corporate seal of the City to be hereunto affixed as of the first day of May, 1930.
