

# POLITICAL ADVERTISEMENT WHEELER TO BE CANDIDATE FOR COUNTY SHERIFF

Deputy For 14 Years Seeks Nomination At Primary In September

William A. Wheeler, of Royal Oak, has announced himself as a candidate for the Republican nomination for Sheriff at the primaries in September.

Mr. Wheeler was for 14 years, until August 1927, a member of the Oakland County Sheriff's



staff. He served under several sheriffs and until his resignation one year ago was in charge of the southern part of Oakland County, having a number of men under his supervision.

Mr. Wheeler has the distinction of being the only man in Oakland County to have earned a \$500 reward for the capture of a criminal, and has had many years' experience in police work.

During Mr. Wheeler's service as a member of the sheriff's staff, he was instrumental in the apprehension and conviction of a number of habitual criminals, and half a dozen men captured by Mr. Wheeler are now serving life terms. While a member of Sheriff Green's staff about nine years ago, Mr. Wheeler made the arrest of Frank Proski, who had murdered a Troy Township resident named Radtke. He was given the \$500 reward-offered for the murderer's capture.

Mr. Wheeler is 54 years old. He was born in Royal Oak and has lived there all his life, residing at present at 529 Knolls street. For four years he was clerk of Royal Oak Township and served a term on the school board and on the village council.

Mr. Wheeler believes in a fair, impartial and rigorous administration of the county police work, and pledges consideration for the needs of every part of the County if elected. His experience and knowledge of police work led many friends to urge his candidacy, and to support him for the nomination at the primaries.

Mr. Wheeler is a member of Royal Oak Masonic, Foresters and Elks' lodges. He is also a member of the Moose and Macabee lodges of Detroit. He has been affiliated with these lodges for more than 15 years.

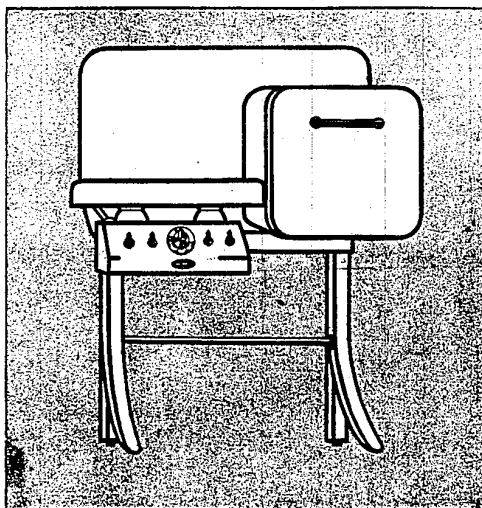
