FARMINGTON HIGH DEFEATS BELLEVILLE

F. H. S. defeated Belleville in the first league game of the season. Due to some fine interference and passing the Tritons were able to run up a score of 13 to 0 against Belleville.

Cox intercepting a pass on Belleville's 30-yard line accounted for the first touchdown. A pass, Cox to Cairns, gave Farmington the extra point.

Belleville gains were made mostly through the line, but all attempts at passing were incomplete or intercepted.

A Belleville attempt to pass on her 25-yard line was intercepted by Cairns. A pass, Cox to Nicholson, put the ball on Belleville's 10-yard line. An end run by Nicholson with fine interference gave the Tritons their second touchdown. The try for point was unsuccessful making the final score 13-0 in favor of Farmington.

To the Qualifying Electors of the Township of Farmington, County of Oakland, State of Michigan.

Provision in Case of Removal to Another Precinct
Sec. II—Part II—Chap. III. Any registered and qualified voter who has removed from one election precinct of a township to another election precinct of the same township shall have the right, on any day previous to election, or primary election day, on application to Township Clerk, to have his or her name transferred from the registration book of the precinct from which he or she has removed to the registration book of the precinct in which he or she then resides. Such elector or she shall have the right to have such transfer made on any election or Primary election day by obtaining from the board of inspectors of such election or primary election of the precinct from which he or she has removed a Certificate of Transfer and presenting the said certificate to the Board of Election Inspectors of the Precinct in which he or she then resides.
