"The Royal Family" is described as: A tremendous interesting and fascinating story of a great family of the American stage. First, there is Fanny Cavendish, wife of the deceased Aubrey Cavendish, "the first actor of his day," who at 70 is planning her tour for the season. Tony, her son, having forsaken the stage for Hollywood, rushes home, only to flee to Europe to escape the attentions of a Polish picture actress. Soon he is back again in New York seeking refuge from a Jewish Balkan princess.

A grand-daughter, Gwen, is just budding into important ingenue roles jolts the family by marrying a non-professional and forsaking the stage, but only temporarily. Through it all, Fanny Cavendish rules the household with her courage and her sharp tongue. Though her children are idols to the public, they are defenseless under the withering fire of the old lady's sarcasm.
