FAKE CHRISTMAS SEALS ARE OFFERED FOR SALE

The close approach of the 1930 sale of Christmas seals was signalized this week by the arrival at the offices of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association of \$1,000,000 seals. Michigan's allotment for the coming sale. Funds secured in the sale finance the organized campaign against tuberculosis.

Although the Christmas seal sale does not begin until Thanksgiving Day, word has come to the Michigan Tuberculosis Association of attempts in different parts of the State to sell seals represented as tuberculosis Christmas seals. These seals, according to the Association, are not authorized tuberculosis Christmas seals although they imitate them closely in form and design.

Seals of this type are purely commercial and are sold for private gain.

While there is no reason for not buying commercial seals when they are sold for what they are, we desire to warn people against purchasing them under the impression that they are buying the Christmas seals that finance anti-tuberculosis work.

The tuberculosis seals may be identified by the red double-barred cross, the emblem of the anti-tuberculosis campaign, which is displayed prominently upon them.

EXPERIMENTATION IN TANK

Ann Arbor, Mich.—The distinction of possessing one of the two naval testing tanks in the country, and the only one in a der an unprecedented load; in city of Michigan Engineering department, whose large covered tank is the scene of much theoretical and practical research and instruction.

A wide variety of tests are regularly carried out by Professor Edward M. Bragg, specialist in marine engineering and naval architecture. A recent investigation was made for the designers of the racing yacht Westacos which was one of the boats built to race Sir Thomas Lipton's Shamrock. Two models of different length and beam were tested and the fastest determined, this was a novel piece of work since it had been thought that a tank could not successfully test wind driven vessels.

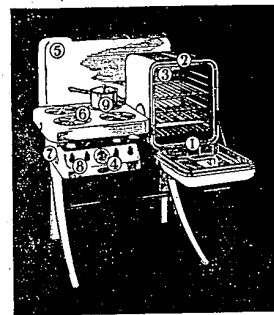
