

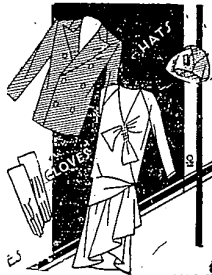

of her grandfather, James Conroy.

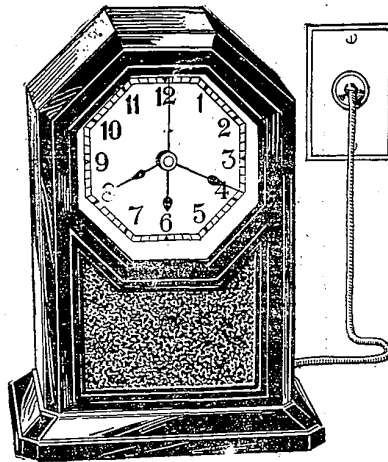
About thirty members of group three of the W. H. M. S. held their Christmas party at the home of Mrs. Spencer Heeney.
