GOOD METHODS MAKE GOOD ALFALFA CROP

East Lansing.—The use of the latest methods in seeding and growing alfalfa proved profitable for Dorr Perry, a Tuscola County farmer, who harvested 262 bushels of Hardigan alfalfa seed from 34 acres this year and then won first place in the Eastern States class for alfalfa seed at the Chicago Hay and Grain Show.

The seed was harvested from

three fields, in one of which the stand is five years old. Mr. Perry uses Hardigan, a winter-hardy variety originated at Michigan State College, and he applies lime and fertilizer in preparation for seeding the alfalfa with oats.
