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Petitions Flood State Office To Save Car Tracks

Huge Number Of Names On Appeals To Keep Grand River Car Line

Petitions bearing page after page of names of citizens of the entire Grand River area between Farmington and Rerford, and including the latter community, asking retention of the trolley tracks to Farmington, have gone in a continuance stream to the State Highway Department at Lansing within the past few weeks, County Road Commissioner Isaac Bond told the Farmington Exchange Club, Wednesday moon.

Petitions are still being circu Petitions are still being circu-lated and as soon as received at the County Road Commission of-fice in Pontiac, are forwarded to Lansing, Mr. Bond said. The ex-tent of the appeal on behalf of the tracks has exceeded anything of the kind in his experience, Mr. Bond told the Club. Besides the petitions, resolu-tions on behalf of the tracks have been passed by organizations

Besides the petitions, resolutions on behalf of the tracks have been passed by organizations throughout the Grand River area, including Redford Exchange Club. three townships, and the City of Farmington. Farmington Exchange Club, immediately following Mr. Bond's report, unanimously passed a resolution asking that the tracks be kept.

As a result of the efforts made in recent weeks, the State Highway Department will place the matter before the new State Administrative Board at its next meeting, according to Mr. Bond. It is believed that the State officials did not realize the number of people who would be affected by tearing up of the tracks, and the extent of the area, development of which might be seriously affected by loss of the rail transportation.

FARMINGTON MAN . HIT BY MACHINE FIGHTING DEATH

Two Attracted To Road By Acci dent, Struck When Another Car Skids

Durwood Lewis, 62, af Farming is, in serious condition in Redford Receiving hospital suffering from severe Injuries sustained when the car driven by Leopold Wiesback, 226 South Millitary street, Detroit, struck him and Ted Zigler, 19, also of Farmington, threw them into the ditch and then overturned and rolled over the two men, Sunday morning. Lewis has two broken arms, broken leg, and cellarbone and skull fracture. Zigler escaped with only minor cuts and druises. He was treated by Dr. H. E. Boice of Farmington and taken home. The accident happened when the two men, who were standing on the pavement watching the removal of another car which had gone into the ditch and been wrecked, were struck by Wieshack's car which apparently had gotten out of his control on the slippery hill. They were hurled into the ditch, the car overturning and rolling over them. Police say that Zigler and Lewis were warned of the peril of standing in the street. Halt Unlicensed **Jitneys Running** On Grand River

Illegal Competition With Trolley Cars Curbed; Machines Re-ported Unsafe

Two drivers of unlicensed "jit neys" on Grand River between Five Points and Farmington were arrested last week end, in a drywe by authorities to stop unauthorized competition with the street railway system, and to protect the public from the danger of riding in the automobiles.

The two drivers, both caught in Farmington, were held on three charges, and were each placed on six months' probation by Municipal Judge John J. Schul te, Jr. Officials are seeking to arrest three others who are known to be operating without permits, with antiquated machines.

The first driver arrested was Charles H. Ripaldi, 36, Negaunee avenue, Southfield Township, who was nabbed Friday by Chief of Police Lee Doyle at Grand River and Farmington road. Chief Doyle had ridden with Ripaldi, from Five Points, and on alighting asked how much was due.

"We can't charge," Ripaliti answered, according to a report made by Chief Doyle to the City Commission. "But whatever is right." After a brief discussion. Chief Doyle handed Ripaldi a dollar bill, and received 30 cents in change. Ripaldi was taken to police headquarters and arraigned Saturday morning, on charges police headquarters and arraign-ed Saturday morning, on charges of operating without a Michigan Public Utilities Commission li-cense, chaufteur's license, or com-mercial plates.

Caught After Chase

The second driver arrested made an attempt to escape, and was caught only after a chase of a mile. Earl Meyers, who had been deputized for the purpose, arrested Gao. A. Schebel, 22, 6429 Floyd street, Detroit, on Saturday, at Farmington's main corner. Meyers directed Schebel to drive to the booth, police reported, but instead he shouted "Goodbye," and sped away, turning north to Thomas street, then east and back to Grand River. Meyers ran to the police booth, and with Chief Doyle caught Schebel at Grand River and Lakeway drive.

Schebel was arraigned immediately on the same charges as Ripaldi, and the same sentence was

imposed.

Farmington officials became in terested in the jitneys' running first through the efforts made to save the car tracks. The authorities feel that since they are appealing strongly to the State for retention of the tracks, and have worked hard to assure continuance of the car service, the least they can do is to exert every effort to stop unauthorized competition which has been cutting into the streetcar revenues. Equally important, they feel, is the duty to protect the public, including citizens of Farmington, from possible serious consequence sof riding the "filters." All of them are reported to be old cars, and in an unsafe condition for travel. Possibility of an accident is declared to be much greater than with the average well-conditioned automobile, and since the drivers carry no insurance and are usually not financially responsible, the passengers are not only in danger, but would have no means of redress in case of injury. of injury.

Report Township May Get School Money Next Week

Representatives Get Promise Of Loan From Bond Company; Suit Delayed

The Township-school districts money problem, which has perplexed officials of Farmington Township and the eleven school districts therein for hearly a year, may be favorably settled within the coming week, according to a-report made Tuesday evening to the Township Board by Justice of the Peace, Willis T. Roberts.

Mr. Roberts, authorized three weeks ago to interview the bond company which issued the bonds for the former Township treasurer, reported that the company officials had promised to make a loan to the Township of approximately-\$45,000, needed to pay the school districts the money due them. The promise was made to Mr. Roberts and Supervisor Arthur P. Coe, who together interviewed the bond company.

The money, would be furnished as a loan to the Township for a number of years, probably five, to be paid back in yearly installments. It was indicated that only some unfoiseen difficulty would prevent the proposed loan from going through.
