TO BEAUTIFY HOMES
East Lansing.—An increasing number of Michigan farmers are deciding that it is just as profitable to live in an attractive house with a yard with well planned plantings of shrubs and flowers, and they are asking for the assistance of O. I. Gregg, extension specialist in landscape gardening at Michigan State College.

Actual plantings of shrubs were made by Mr. Gregg at 37 different places in the State. These plantings are made to enable all the people in the community to see just how the shrubs should be placed and to give them a chance to ask questions about the kind of plants which would be adapted for use at their own homes.
