Mother Of 6 Admits Forging Of Checks

Mrs. Mowry said she lived on Base Line road with relatives named Brown, that her husband was dead and she had no children. She said her sister had brought her to Farmington.

Chief Doyle communicated with the Peoples State Bank. The similarity of Mrs. Mowry's appearance to the description of a woman who had passed a worthless check for \$38 in that bank last November, caused him to link the two cases. Chief Doyle called Chief George Springer at Plymouth.

Chief Springer stated that there was no "803 Wing street" at Plymouth, and no "Ruth Butler" living there. He started for Farmington at once. Chief Doyle learned there was no one living on the Base Line road named Brown.

Known To Chief

When Chief Springer arrived he greeted Mrs. Mowry by name. After half an hour's questioning she admitted, police said, writing Mr. Russell's name on the check, and the cashing of the check last November in the Peoples State Bank. Police said she also confessed to two forgeries in Plymouth of checks for \$23.50 and \$16.65. They reported that she is sought in similar charges in Northville, Wayne, and Ypsilanti.

Mrs. Mowry said her husband had been working only three days a week, but authorities said he has been employed on full time.

The check cashed at the Peoples State Bank two months ago was a forgery using the name of George Robinson, president of the village of Plymouth. The check was drawn to "Frank Markey," and endorsed "Alice Hazen." No one by either name is known to Plymouth authorities.
