FORD OFFERS 23 NEW TYPES OF AUTO BODIES

Twenty-three new body types designed to meet the specialized needs of various classes of commercial transportation, have been added to the standard line of Ford trucks and light delivery cars, the Ford Motor Company announced.

Several of the new trucks and commercial cars already are in production. The others will be placed on a production basis within the next two months.

The addition of the score of new body types, ranging from a smart town car delivery for the use of exclusive shops to police patrols and coal and coke trucks, was made in accordance with the Ford Motor Company's policy of offering a complete line of commercial vehicles to meet all sorts of transportation requirements.

The system has already been installed in the Klausen routes and is to be extended to the Simpson Pass, the St. Gothard, the Grond St. Bernard, the Furka and a number of other mountain passes and routes.
