on February 17 will be held in a hall large enough to accommodate a large number of citizens, probably Oddfellows' hall at Clarenceville. All residents of the Township interested are welcomed to attend and express their views.

Township Clerk Willard Campbell has written the, Attorney-General's office for its opinion, following presentation of divergent views of attorneys. Attorney James H. Lynch of Pontiac, consulted by Township officials, offered the opinion that the contract between the Township and City is illegal. On the other hand, a representative of the fire engine company presented copies of opinions of the assistant prosecutor of Kent County, and of the prosecuting attorney of Genesee County, to the effect that such a contract is within the State law. He stated that his company does not desire to try to force acceptance of the truck, and would be willing to cancel the order. The arrangements were made on the basis of similar circumstances in other communities, he said.

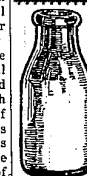
## MAYOR FLOOR MANAGER OF WOMAN'S CLUB DANCE
