

This dirt, hauled for us, with no cost to the Township, allowed us to put through Parker avenue on Krave sublet vision, a job estimated at \$600, for about \$40. It also enabled us to widen Tuck road, and Rockwell avenue north of Grand River. We have saved by following the construction of Grand River and intercepting the contractors, 90 feet of 24 inch corrugated culverts, and 60 feet of 18-inch corrugated pipe, which would otherwise have been destroyed, but which would have cost us, if purchased, approximately \$300.
