Kirchoff Wins

James Kirchoff, incumbent, defeated Daniel Hughes for the Republican nomination for highway commissioner, 372 to 243. Irving Johnson polled 58 votes as Democratic nominee.

Supervisor George Bingham easily defeated L. Stuart Garden for the Republican nomination for supervisor, 433 to 187. Chas. Bilkovsky won the Democratic nomination, getting 52 votes. Karl Tibbits received 22 and August Miller, 10.

Mrs. Ona M. Utley, Township Clerk, received 67 votes as Democratic nominee and Albert Jacobs, Republican, received 398.

Treasurer Arthur Baynes was nominated by the Republicans for justice of the peace for full term. William Davis is the Democratic nominee. J. Bateman Wood defeated S. D. McClelland, 301 to 254 for justice of peace to fill vacancy.

Democrats To Fight

Southfield Democrats say that the top-heavy vote for Republican candidates, who in many cases received 7 or 8 times as many ballots as the Democrats, means nothing so far as the election on April 6 is concerned. They say the small Democratic vote is caused merely by the fact that many

voters hesitate to ask for a Democratic ballot at a primary, but that when they come to vote in the election, it will be "a different story." They plan, at least, a vigorous campaign.

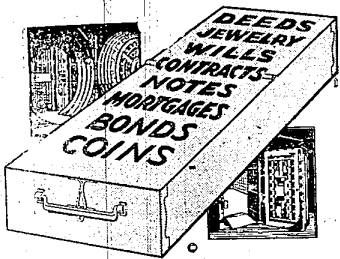

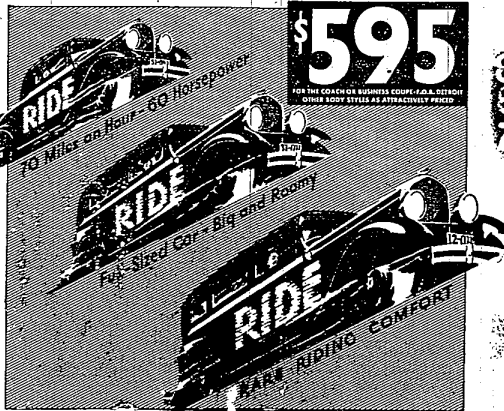
