Was Treasurer Of Walled Lake School Board; Death Follows Operation

Funeral services for William J. Campbell treasurer of the Walled Lake Consolidated School Board, was held Thursday afternoon at the home near 14-Mile road in Novi Township. Rev. Joseph Chapman of Oxford officiated and burial was in Grand Lawn cemetery, Redford.

Mr. Campbell died at 8 o'clock Monday night in Harper hospital, Detroit, following an operation. Apparently on the road to recovery, he suffered a relapse late Monday afternoon. Death followed soon after. He was 57 years old, having been born in St. Clair county, October 15, 1881.

He moved to this section with his parents when only a small boy and had lived here since then. In 1907 he was married to Miss Alta Johns, who survives him.


