EASY MEASURES STOP LOSSES FROM GOITER

Michigan flockmasters can pre-Michigan flockmasters can pre-vent the occurrence of goifer in next spring's lambs by feeding their breeding ewes one or two grains daily of either potassium iodide or sodiumm iodide, accord-andry specialists at Michigan State College.

The chemical can be fed to the The chemical can be fed to the ewes by mixing it with grain or it can be dissolved and poured over the sait which is fed to the sheep. Another method of admmin istering the medicine is to mix one ounce of it with 25 pounds of sait and 25 pounds of steamed hone made. bone meal.

Care must be taken in mixing the chemical with the salt and bone meal to get an even distribution of the iodide. It is best not to make up too large a quantity of the mixture at one time.

More than 1,000,000 persons in 862 drought-stricken counties of 20 States came under the care of the American Red Cross in what developed into the most extensive relief operations in half a century of ministering to stricken humanity.


