Something was said about dowdy dress indicating a dowdy mind, and that teachers should give more thought to their appearance and fashion.

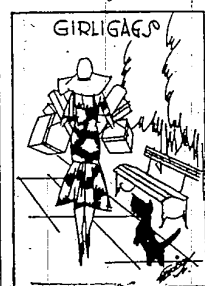
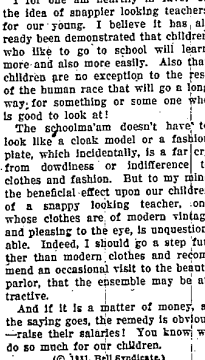
Now what is so terrible about that, to bring down to the fact of its author's mention of jazz musicians and others.

Celebrate Army Day On Monday, April 6

Governor Wilbur M. Brucker on Saturday, March 28, issued a proclamation designating Monday, April 6, as Army Day, on which tribute will be paid to the services "the army of the United States has rendered to the nation during the 155 years of its existence."

Governor Brucker urges the general display of the American flag on April 5, and that appropriate exercises be held in each community. Arrangements are being made here and elsewhere throughout the state for participation in the observance by the public schools, club, fraternal and military bodies, individuals and mercantile concerns, which have been requested to display the flag on their buildings and in their windows.

Mayor Arthur Lamb joined in urging observance of the day.
