Continued from page one) similar in kind; in Montana, which has the death penalty, the murder rate is four times that of North Dakota, which has abolished capital punishment...

"Was Converted" Captain Edward Denniston, superintendent of the Detroit House of Correction, second speaker for the affirmative, said that he had been against capital punishment until the day of the Detroit News holdup...

"People don't give enough consideration to the officer doing his duty. You want to remember that the policeman's wife and his children are just as dear to him as yours are to you..."

"Now I am going to say something that will surprise you but will not, I hope, shock you," continued Captain Denniston. "I am in favor of capital punishment for gangsters, but I am against the Foster bill, which is to be voted on Monday, because I don't believe that all cases of murder carry the death penalty..."

"Innocent Man Held" Judge Edward Jeffries of the Records Court, Detroit, was the last speaker, arguing against capital punishment. He declared that while he "has more men in prison than another judge in Michigan, I never sent a man to jail that I was not sorry for..."

An interesting personal experience bearing on capital punishment, which citizens of Michigan will vote on Monday, was related to the Enterprise this week by Mrs. Charlotte Wolfe, well-known resident of West Point Park.

"I could never vote for capital punishment, and I will tell you why. Many years ago, when we lived in Canada, there were in the community two neighboring families, very close friends. One day a son, about 25 years old, disappeared from one of the homes..."
