History Of County Movement Is Traced By Secretary; Tells Of Camp

Disease Kills Huge Number Of Chickens

East Lansing.—A poultry disease which destroys 2,000,000 chicks in Michigan each year can be controlled by feeding a proper ration and by disinfecting the brooder houses with an effective disinfectant, according to the poultry department of Michigan State College.

The disease, coccidiosis, usually attacks chicks in the early stages of their growth. It may affect older fowls but most of the losses are among the younger birds. The diseased fowls lack color, are inactive, and, in the flock, a few chicks die each day. Chicks which show symptoms of the disease should immediately be fed for 10 days an all mash ration which contains at least 40 per cent of dried milk powder. The brooder house should be thoroughly cleaned every three days and disinfected with iodine suspension.

The ration containing the skim milk powder will cure diseased birds if they retain enough vitality to eat.

New Dust-Laying Spray Process Is Described

A new treatment of roads for dust-laying was described to the Farmington City Commission on Monday evening. The process consists of spraying liquid calcium chloride on the roads, it being claimed that the liquid is absorbed within an hour after the spraying.


The process has been used only in Wayne County thus far, it was stated, it "being originated only last year.

Incidentally, it was revealed that Oakland County is the largest user of dust-laying products of any county in the United States, having spent \$75,000 last summer to keep down the dust.
