(Continued from page one) ing the appearance in court, the districts would at least get its share of whatever was collected, and the only other hope lies in individual suit by each district. He explained that the court will undoubtedly order the Township to set-up a special fund to be put in the budget for a period of five years and that money raised for this fund could be used only to pay this particular debt.  
Joseph Graham and Leo Fendt were present from the Thayer district, and at first stated they would probably not go in on the plan. It was later indicated, however, that they might alter this decision and join the others. The Thayer district has \$1,934.47 due, plus interest.

**"Won't Pay Taxes"**  
Mrs. E. T. Sturman, representing the German district Board, said she believed that board would not go in on the plan. She declared that "You can pile more and more taxes on the people, but they won't pay them." The German district has \$737.11 due, and interest.

Supervisor Arthur P. Coe stated that the Township Board expects to be able to pay the debts over a period of a few years without increasing the tax-rate, thru economy. Mr. Coe said that the Board believes it can lower the budget \$12,000 in the matter of road repair and lighting, and thus within three to five years wipe out the school district debts.

**Largest Debt**  
Payment of the \$7,000 to Clarenceville schools leaves Farmington District No. 5 the largest creditor, with over \$11,000 due. Noble school district is next with over \$9,000, and the Clarenceville balance is third largest. Bond school district is fourth.

Farmington district No. 5 was represented only by President A. L. Ross, but he was confident the other four members would agree the arrangement was the best possible under the circumstances. The entire Noble district board was present. West Farmington was represented by Jay Button, Bond district by Isaac Bond and Mr. Coe, Walled Lake Consolidated fractional by M. L. Bradley and Supt. Harry E. Nesman, No. 4 fractional by Ernest Blanchard.

Mr. Lynch advised that if any of the district boards change their minds, they may notify him within ten days. The matter must be settled before May 5, when the Township Board begins to make up the annual budget.

**Those Were the Happy Days!**

Ask any of the 400 boys who attended the Oakland County Y. M. C. A. Camp on Loon Lake last summer! They'll tell you there's a real kick in outdoor life in Michigan's North Woods! Long hikes, in which camp was pitched at sunset and broken in the morning, as pictured here, are a feature of life at the camp. The coming summer will be the second that the camp has run, and arrangements for even greater attendance are being made.

Just a few weeks more and the woods up around Loon Lake, where the fragrant blossoms of the arbutus are budding right now beneath the snow, will echo to the thud and rattle of axes as the final preparations go forward for the second season of the Oakland County Y. M. C. A. Camp. Then, late in June, a motor caravan will roll northward along M-23, bearing the first contingent of the camp's 400 boys for the season of 1931. This will be the second season for this great county-wide enterprise which a group of Oakland County leaders established last year. Last summer saw 400 boys, from all corners of the county, encamped with 35 adult counselors, under conditions nothing short of ideal.

The location itself is excellent, to begin with. It is 150 miles north of Pontiac, near U. S. Highway 23, near enough home to permit parental supervision, and yet far enough to make camping a real adventure. The site is made up of beautiful wooded country, 22 acres in extent, stretching for more than a mile along the shore of Loon Lake, in Iosco County. The terrain affords high and dry campsites, as well as excellent water, and nearby are abundant sources of dairy goods, fruit, and other food.

The country around the camp bears so little resemblance to anything found in Oakland County as to furnish a fresh "kick" every day of the boy's camp life. The lumberman's axe resounded through the Iosco County forests so long ago that many acres, some of them within the camp property, are covered with lofty second-growth timber, which will still interfere to the original stand, gives the camper some conception of how Michigan must have looked before it was denuded.

Several points of great interest are within hiking distance of camp. The At Seble, famous not only for the part it played back in logging days, but also as a trout stream and a source of hydro-electric power, is only a few miles away. Five Channels Dam is a spot in which the boys took great interest.

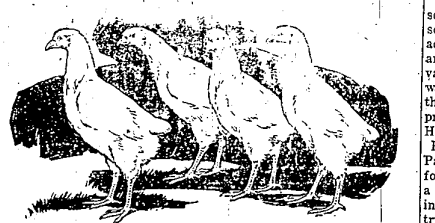

**MINISTER TELLS OF CUSTOMS AND LIFE IN TURKEY**

Says "Backward" Nation More Advanced Than United States, In Some Respects

An intensely interesting description of life in Turkey, in some respects one of the most backward nations on the globe, and in other ways much more advanced than the United States, was afforded women attending the Farmington Woman's Club program in M. E. Community Hall, Wednesday afternoon.

Rev. John Adams of West Point Park Presbyterian church, who formerly held a high position on a Turkish University faculty, told in a fascinating way of the country where he lived for some time. Exploited from without by more aggressive nations and from within by their own rapacious rulers, the Turkish people have lost ambition, Rev. Adams said. Even great cities have no sanitary facilities, but on the other hand, Turkey protects its mothers and babies far better than the United States. It has over 200 clinics and certified milk is provided by the government. Rev. Adams spoke forcefully of the difference in education, declaring that the teachers in Turkey evince a much greater personal interest in their pupils, and are in turn shown much more consideration and respect by both parents and children, than in America.
