**LETTERS TO THE EDITOR**

To the Editor:  
The recent action of the School Board in regard to officially adopting and making legal the method of conducting the annual school elections as contained in a motion offered by Mr. Nichols and adopted almost unanimously by the electors at the annual district meeting last summer seems to be a rather flagrant disregard of the expressed wishes of the people. As I understand it, the Board's action as predicated in its efforts to effect economies wherever possible, but an analysis of the probable cost of carrying out this plan makes the rejection of it seem like a "penny wise and pound foolish" policy.

An aroused public interest in school affairs will result in more efficient and economical management than all the outgrown methods possible to be retained.

Under the present method of electing members of the School Board a great many people do not think about the qualifications of the prospective candidates because until they are nominated during the annual meeting no one knows who they are to be.

Nomination by petition and election by secret ballot makes possible selection on merits and qualifications or on the issues involved uninfluenced by the presence of candidates at the time of balloting.

The Board has made a mistake in this matter that it is too late to rectify this year. If it is necessary the electors should see to it that members are elected to the Board next summer that will feel obligated to carry out their expressed mandates.
