

An aroused public interest in school affairs will result in more efficient and economical management than all the outgrown methods possible to be retained.

Under the present method of electing members of the School Board a great many people do not think about the qualifications of the prospective candidates because until they are nominated during the annual meeting no one knows who they are to be.

Nomination by secret ballot makes possible selection on ments and qualifications or on the issues involved uninfluenced by the presence of candidates at the time of balloting.

The Board has made a mistake in this matter that it is no lease to rectify this year.
