DEPLORES WORLD'S LOSING THE ART OF CONVERSATION

Rev. Eva Declares "There Is Too Much Formal Speech-Making Nowadays"

"One of the great disasters of our modern civilization, with its automobiles, airplanes, radio and the like, is the loss of the art of conversation," Rev. Sidney D. Eva, former pastor of Farmington Methodist church, told members of Farmington Exchange club at its meeting Wednesday noon.

Rev. Eva, now of Mt. Clemens, said that he believes "there is too much formal speech-making nowadays," and that this is particularly true of luncheon clubs. Very often these clubs are used, he declared, by speakers and others who are interested only in "putting something over."

Rev. Eva said he believed many of the great problems of state and nation were solved by our ancestors in conversation around a store or before a logfire, rather than through oratory in great halls. He expressed the opinion that luncheon clubs should be conducted primarily for their social value.

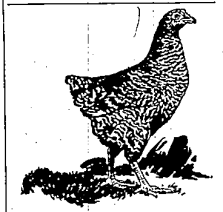
