Coleman Residence Is Burned To Ground

of Mrs. Charles Heliker to the south across the pavement might be set afire. Firemen and neighbors remained for a long time as a precaution.

Only the basement and a few twisted pipes are left of the Coleman home. Mr. Coleman, who has been in a hospital and was to have returned home Monday, has remained in the hospital, while Mrs. Coleman is at the home of Fred Bado on 11-Mile road.

**Save Furniture**

Although the house could not be saved, neighbors and others carried off practically all of the furniture on the first floor. A nearby shed was scorched, but the firemen kept it from burning down.

Because of the danger to the barns and to the Heliker home, a call was sent in for the Farmington City engine. The Township truck having been sent on the first alarm.

The fire started on the roof, near the chimney. It was discovered by Mrs. Coleman, when she detected smoke upstairs. She called the hired man, W. D. MacCown, who was at the barn. He came at once, and they endeavored to check the fire with water and two extinguishers which they had at the house, while awaiting the fire department.

**Wind Strong**

Mrs. Coleman said that although they did everything they could, the wind was so strong at the time that whenever a door was opened, it fanned the flames and spread the fire.

Stanley Coe and Frank Nichols passed in a car and saw the fire also. By the time the fire apparatus could reach the house, the flames had spread between the walls to such an extent that there was no hope of saving the building.
