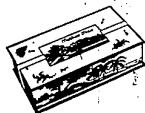

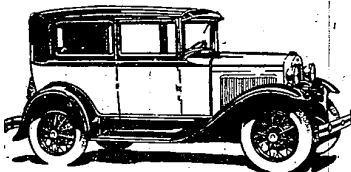

ALLOWS ONE HIT, STRIKES OUT 13, BUT LOSES GAME

Belleville Scores Twice On Errors And Fendt Loses Mound Duel, 2 To 1.

One Farmington High School boy, Ray Fendt, has learned early in life that one may work for and richly deserve something—and still not get it. Ray, a junior, pitched a one-hit baseball game for Farmington High against Belleville last Friday, striking out 13 men, yet he had to lose, the score being 2 to 1. Both of the Belleville runs resulted from errors.

Farmington had plenty of opportunities to win the game, the first to be played on the Farmington athletic field this year. Two times Farmington had the bases filled, but each time the batter struck out.

In the last inning Fendt popped out ending the game with the tying run on second. Apparently Farmington's pitcher had made up his mind that it was no use anyway, and so Farmington's last chance faded.

Farmington scored in the first inning, a base on balls to Ivan Cox opening the way for the tally. Farmington made five errors, these misplays permitting Belleville to score in the fourth and sixth innings. Only seven innings were played.
