FARMINGTON CLUB IS HOST TO 160 OF EXCHANGE

College President Speaks On "Friendship"; Report Is Made On Unemployment

The distinction of having sponsored the largest and most enjoyable meeting in the history of the Council of Exchange Clubs of the Detroit Metropolitan Area came to the Farmington club last Thursday evening when 160 members of 35 exchange groups attended the Council's monthly meeting. The Council's business meeting was followed by a program, with President William G. Spencer of Hillsdale College as speaker.

Speaking on "Friendship," President Spencer quoted Cicero's statement that "Where the current of life runs swiftly and the prizes are worth having," few friendships endure. He cited as instances the friendships of William Howard Taft and Theodore Roosevelt of Woodrow Wilson and Colonel House, of David and Jonathan, of Lord Tennyson and Arthur Henry Hallam. The latter two friendships endured until death, he said, but in each of these cases, the friendship was made famous by the lament of one over the death of the other.

Rev. Floyd Johnson reporting for the unemployment committee, declared that the times require that we do a great deal to help the other fellow, and that "we are not doing it as we should." The present depression, he said, has hit a class never stricken before, the "white collar class," so that thousands of capable, intelligent, highly educated men are today seeking jobs, willing to work "for almost any kind of pay."

The Council voted to sponsor a "Church Sunday" event, members of the clubs to attend Christ Church, Cranbrook, in a body, and to visit Cranbrook School, on a Sunday afternoon.

During the evening, "Eddie" McGrath entertained with songs, and led in community singing. The Farmington High School Band furnished music. Arrangements for the meeting were made by Arthur Lamb, assisted by Rev. Johnson. The dinner was held in the M. E. Church dining room.
