Mr. and Mrs. Robert Jones spent Thursday evening in Detroit, where they visited at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Nacker.

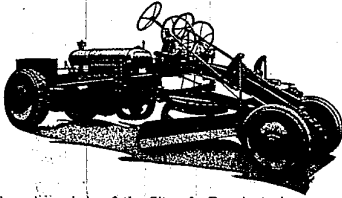
