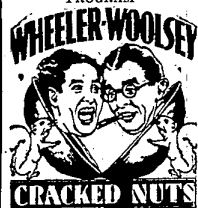

MICHIGAN PROFESSOR-EX-
PLORER ONE OF SIX BEST
Ann Arbor—Lawrence Gould,
Associate Professor of Geology
in the University and famous for
his work in Greenland and as sec-
ond in command with Admiral
Byrd in the Anarctic, was praised
highly by George Palmer Put-
nam, New York publisher and ex-
plorer.

Asked by New York paper to
nominate an "all star" team of
explorers and adventurers, Put-
nam, who is known by fellow
members of the Explorers Club as
"president of the explorers trust",
named a team consisting of Sir
George Herbert Wilkins, Roy
Chapman Andrews, Lawrence
Gould, Bernt Balchen, William Be-
bee, and Lindbergh. "Gould is
certain to be recognized as an, if
not the, outstanding scientific ex-
plorer of tomorrow," said Putnam.
Wilkins was nominated as an ideal
captain for such a group. And-
rews, noted for his Asiatic ex-
plorations, "is the leading Amer-
ican organizer and administrator
of expeditions". Lindbergh was
named as expert aviator; Beebe as
naturalist and ideal lecturer;
Gould as scientist; and Bernt Bal-
chen as one who "can live in the
snow, fly, navigate, ski, cook or
fight."
