### Crashes Into Pole Here; Given \$15 Fine

Trying to elude capture by Deputy Sheriff William Tamm, who chased him from outside the city limits, Frank Pyper of Webberville, Mich. crashed into an Edison pole in Farmington near the General Garage, Monday. He was taken into custody and charged with drunk driving. When arraigned before Judge Henry W. Harpster in Pontiac, Tuesday, Pyper pleaded guilty and was given a fine of \$75 or 50 days in jail. Two companions paid fines of \$15 each for being drunk. Deputy Tamm began his chase two miles west of Farmington City limits. Pyper attempted to turn off of Grand River into a side street west of the garage, and crashed into the pole.

### COUNTY LEADER IN AGRICULTURAL WORK GIVES TALK

Scope And Nature Of Work Outlined By Oakland Agent, K. D. Bailey

How the government seeks to aid the farmer in finding the way to productive, profitable farming, was told to members of Farmington Exchange Club Wednesday noon by K. D. Bailey, Oakland County Agricultural Agent. Mr. Bailey's talk proved as interesting to the business-man as to the farmer, revealing some of the ways in which farmers are brought to realize that they must be good business-men in order to be successful farmers.

Mr. Bailey's work is supported by the State, County and U. S. Department of Agriculture, and includes many phases of farming. Most Oakland County soil is strongly acid, he said, making it unfavorable for many crops, but there also exist in almost every part of the County beds of marl or limestone, which can be dug out and spread over the acid soil, acting as a reagent and desirable fertilizer. More and more farmers are taking advantage of marl beds, Mr. Bailey said, and profiting accordingly.

Analyzing the soil and choosing the right crop, then utilizing modern knowledge and methods to increase and improve the yield, leads to profit for the farmer, Mr. Bailey said. One of the three most financially successful farmers in Michigan last year, he stated, was an Oakland County man who formerly raised a general crop, but now concentrates on alfalfa and peaches.

Oakland County has only a little more than half the number of farms it had five years ago, Mr. Bailey said, quoting census figures which show 2,400 farms in the County in 1930 as against 4,000 listed in 1925. One of the chief aims at present, he stated, is to regain for Michigan farmers the quality markets they have lost several important food products, mainly potatoes.

Particularly interesting was Mr. Bailey's discussion of the newly-discovered properties of calcium chlorate as a powerful weed-killer, which kills every kind of weed.

Mr. Bailey was the guest of Edward Baker, Harry McCracken, who was Oakland County's first agricultural agent, was also a guest. Mr. Bailey said that Mr. McCracken, as food administrator for the County during the war, had the job of trying to get farmers to raise more food, "and was so successful that every county agent since that time has been trying to get them to raise less."

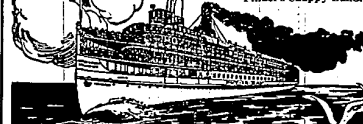
