Pigeon for four years. Mrs. Wixom received many attractive gifts. Guests present from Detroit, Redford, Northville and Lansing.

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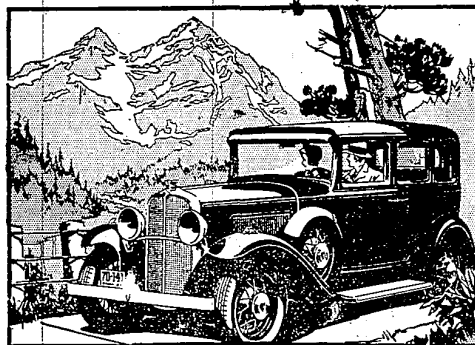
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
