eleventh and twelfth grade pupils, up to the amount of the Farmington tuition, which is \$90, was approved by the voters. Parents of pupils desiring to attend a school with higher tuition, such as Redford, at \$140, will have to make up the difference themselves. It was voted to continue free text-books.

Supt. J. B. Prescott was called on for a brief talk. He thanked the people of the District for their co-operation in the past year. He said that in all but two grades enrollment has been above normal. All of the comments that had come from parents have been "encouraging words," said Mr. Prescott, "and these were welcome because it sometimes appears that perhaps all we may be getting later on is encouraging words." Nevertheless, he said, the school would carry on and give the children the very best that is possible under whatever conditions arise.

The time for next year's meeting was set at eight o'clock.

reduction on his own responsibility, though holding similar views. He concurred in the report, and a valuation of \$6,614,443 was reported to the County, considerably under the proposed figure proposed by the equalization committee. Of the total, \$5,937,230 was real estate and \$227,203 personal property.

Add To Real Estate

The equalization committee added \$1,262,047 to the real estate valuation reported by Supervisor Coe, making a total for the Township of \$7,426,480. This is about half a million dollars less than was first proposed by the equalization committee.

Farmington City's valuation for the year as decided by the supervisors, totals \$1,944,160, as compared with \$2,633,039 last year. The percentage the City pays this year is to be .00607550, as compared with .006113 in 1930.

The valuation proposed by the equalization committee last Spring was \$2,078,430. The assessment made was \$1,828,290 of real estate and \$308,014 of personal property, making a total of \$2,136,304 reported to the County. The equalization committee reduced the real estate by \$192,144.

Only four of the governing units in the County were given increases in valuations by the equalization committee, these being Bloomfield, Independence and Waterford Townships, and the City of Pleasant Ridge. All others were reduced.

PLYMOUTH WITH "FLOATING POWER" ON DISPLAY HERE

By means of this frame, the car's center of gravity is brought very close to the ground. "In power and speed, the new Plymouth also is advanced. The new engine develops 56 horsepower, which in road tests shows speeds of 65 or 70 miles an hour. Many other new features are presented in this new car—carburetor intake silencer, four rings per piston, Silver Dome high compression engine head designed to use ordinary fuel, vacuum controlled spark retard for smooth idle in addition to full automatic spark advance, water temperature indicator on the instrument panel.
