

Annual Report

SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 5 CITY AND TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON

The annual meeting of School District No. 5 City and Township of Farmington was held June 8 in the High School assembly room. The meeting was called to order by Pres. A. L. Ross at 8 o'clock P. M. The minutes of preceding annual meeting were read and accepted.

A motion was made by Arthur Lamb, supported by Floyd Nichols, that the tellers be appointed. Motion carried. Spencer Heener, Mrs. Lee Hill and Erskine Evans were named as tellers by Pres. A. L. Ross.

Nominations were called to fill the vacancy caused by the expiration of the term of Mrs. Blanche Roos. Miss Ida Steele nominated Mrs. Blanche Roos to succeed herself. The nomination was supported by Mrs. E. W. Fink. Howard Warner was nominated by N. H. Power and the nomination was supported by Mrs. M. B. Pierce. A motion was made by Lloyd Gulien that the nominations be closed. The motion was carried, and the nominations closed. The ballot was taken and Erskine Evans reported for the tellers as follows: Votes cast 70, Mrs. Blanche Roos 22, Howard Warner 48. Howard Warner declared elected.

Nominations were called to fill the second vacancy caused by the expiration of the term of Mrs. Florence Lee. Arthur Lamb nominated Mrs. Florence Lee to succeed herself. There being no further nominations, the nominations were closed and the tellers instructed to proceed with the ballot. The result of the ballot was as follows: Votes cast 73, Mrs. Florence Lee 38, Miss Helen Hard 1, Mrs. Blanche Roos 1, Erskine Evans 1 and 2 blank. Mrs. Florence Lee declared elected.

A motion was made, supported, and carried that meeting adjourn. Meeting adjourned.
