The annual meeting of School District No. 2, Livonia Township, was held Monday, July 13, 1931 in the school house at 8:00. The polls were open from 8:00 to 10:00 for the election of two trustees. Ballots were cast for the name of Fred Garchow as candidate for trustee, he having the only nomination petition, blank space being left for the other name.

Total ballots cast were 25, of which Fred Garchow received 24 as first trustee. For the second trustee Ernest Ash received 10, Melvin E. Ash 7 with 3 scattered votes. Fred Garchow and Ernest Ash were declared elected.

After the election the financial report was read. Motion to accept the report was made by William McIntosh and supported by Frank E. Bradley. Motion carried.

QUAKE PICTURES REACH PAPERS BY TELEPHOTOGRAPH

Photos of Nicaraguan Disaster Sent by Wire From Atlanta After Arrival by Plane

Pictures of the earthquake-shattered ruins of Managua, Nicaragua, were received in New York City and in other cities throughout the country only thirty-six hours after they had been started on their way from the Nicaraguan capital—a new record in the transmission of photographs.

These pictures of the Nicaraguan disaster were sent via airplane and the telephoto service of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company. The pictures left the flying field near Managua at 2:30 P. M. on Wednesday, April 1, in a Pan-American Airways plane, traveling on its regular mail schedule. The plane reached Havana, Cuba, by way of Salvador, Honduras, and Mexico at 5:15 P. M., Thursday, and a special plane with motor running was waiting. This plane took off for Miami ten minutes after the arrival of the plane from Nicaragua. It reached the Florida city at 7:30 P. M. Special arrangements had been made there with the customs service, so that there was no delay.

Ten minutes after their arrival in Miami the films were in the air again in another special plane bound for Atlanta, Ga., the nearest point where telephoto sending apparatus is maintained. The films reached Atlanta at 2:05 A. M., Friday, April 3. There they were swiftly developed, and within a few minutes nine pictures were ready for the telephoto machine. At 3:50 A. M. the first was in New York, ready for publication, and at the same time they were also speeding on the telephoto circuit to the cities of St. Louis, Cleveland, Boston, Chicago, Los Angeles and San Francisco.
