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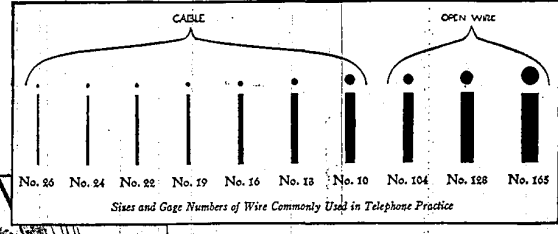

 Called to order by Mayor Lamb at 7:35 p. m.  
 Commissioners present: Stemann, Gildemeister, Hamlin, Goers, Osmus and Hatton.  
 Minutes of the meeting of July 20 read and approved.  
 The bond of Hinman Nichols, City Treasurer, for \$5,000.00 with two sureties was presented. Moved by Gildemeister, seconded by Goers, that the bonds be accepted. Carried.  
 Moved by Hatton, seconded by Gildemeister, that we extend the payment of taxes without penalty until August 31. Carried.  
 Mr. Oakes of the State Highway Dept. spoke to the Commissioner in regard to the construction of sidewalks on Grand River Ave. He said the Department thinks the City should build them. With this opinion the Mayor and Commissioners did not agree. Mayor Lamb called Mr. Oakes' attention to the error made by the State in laying of the cement recently. It encroaches upon the south side of the street and makes the location of the sidewalk a difficult matter. The State will make a new survey.

**DOM PEDRO'S MESSENGER IS TELEPHONE PIONEER**  
 Relics which remind him of half a century ago aid John A. McCraith, 75 years old, to find happiness in the declining years of his life, while he is forced to remain indigent at his home in Trenton, N. J., because of illness. McCraith is a pioneer telephone man, and even before he became associated with the industry the telephone played an important part in his life.  
 For McCraith was a special messenger to Don Pedro, Emperor of Brazil, and it was Don Pedro who first called the attention of the world to the new invention of Alexander Graham Bell. The telephone was accorded such recognition while on exhibition at the Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia in 1876 until Don Pedro happened along and on hearing a demonstration of it uttered his famous words, "My God, it talks!"  
 McCraith's messenger boy, seems also to have been impressed by Bell's instrument, for five years later when the Trenton Telephone Company was incorporated, he became connected with the organization and acted as its manager until 1905.

### Your Voice May Travel Over Wires of Many Sizes

In the early days, all telephone circuits were "open wire"—bare wires suspended on glass insulators overhead on poles. This led to congestion of poles and wires on city streets, and no wires were bunched together in cables which could, when necessary, be placed underground. Where forty years ago the biggest telephone cable contained 50 pairs of stout wire, the local cable shown at the right carries 1,618 pairs—5,636 separately insulated wires in a lead sheath only 2 1/2 inches in diameter!



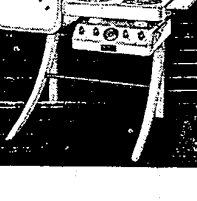
The size of the wire used in the country's telephone network depends upon both its purpose and its location. Above are shown the actual sizes of the most commonly used, from the half-like No. 26 gauge to the bulky No. 15 gauge. In use on some open wire long distance circuits. At the left is a cross-country long distance telephone cable, part of one of the transcontinental lines, while the same poles also carry some open wire circuits of the larger sizes.
