## Charles Wixom Out Of Danger

Sheriff's Officers Fail To Find Trace Of Trio Participating In Shooting

Charles B. Wixom, 65 years old, former Farmington resident, who was shot three times when he offered resistance to armed bandits in his drug store at Perry and Gladstone streets Sunday morning in Pontiac, is said by physicians to be out of danger. He was shot twice through the abdomen and once through the left hand in a scuffle with the bandits.

Wixom was at one time a teacher at the Nichols school and both he and his brother, Al Wixom, are well known in this vicinity.

Lake resorts of the county were searched Monday afternoon and night by police and Sheriff's officers in an attempt to locate the three thugs responsible for the attempted holdup and shooting.

Officers have traced three different automobile license numbers of the bandit car, offered by witnesses without success. Detective Sergeant Frank Nelson and Detective Sherry Mapley are the officers on the case.

According to Donald Sutton of Pontiac, the only witness to the shooting, a man entered the store and then apparently, signalled to two men on the outside who entered and approached Wixom in the rear of the store.

At least five shots were fired. One penetrated Wixom's hand and two struck him in the abdomen. Two others went wild, one spent bullet falling beside Sutton after glancing from a wall.

## FIRE DEPARTMENT HAS THREE CALLS WITHIN 2 HOURS

All Alarms Were For Grass Fires—No Damage Reported

Three calls for the Farmington Volunteer Fire department in one hour and 35 minutes is believed to be somewhat of a record. The first call came in Sunday afternoon at 1:10 and was followed 20 minutes later by the second alarm while the department was still at the scene of the first call. Fifteen minutes later the third alarm sounded.

All three fires were of the burning grass variety which has been so common in this vicinity this summer.

The first call was from Schoolcraft road, one-half mile east of Farmington road. The city truck responded to this call. The next alarm was turned in from Farmington Acres, east of Farmington road and south of Eight Mile road. Fred Moss and Norman Barrons answered this call with the township truck. The final alarm was turned in for a grass fire near the lumber yard. No damage was suffered at any of the fires.

The department was called Friday afternoon to the farm of James Erwin, Ten Mile road, where a grass fire was beyond control of neighbors and passer-by. The department was forced to return to Farmington once in order to replenish the chemical tanks. No damage was suffered although it was feared for a time that the fire would sweep into a large woods where it might have done great damage.
