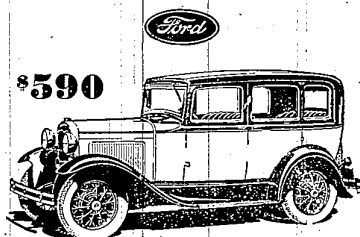

STELLA VANDERBURG TO RECOVER FROM RECENT INJURIES

Next Door Neighbor Drives Her To Hospital Without Knowing Identity

Miss Stella Vandenberg, 18 year old Clarenceville girl, who was seriously injured in an automobile collision at Grand River and Eight Mile roads Friday morning, is expected to recover according to attending physicians. Miss Vandenberg suffered a fractured skull and a broken leg and for a few days was not expected to survive.

Miss Vandenberg is a graduate of Farmington high school with the class of 1929. She was planning to enter a school of chiropody this fall in Ohio but she will be confined to the hospital for some time.

Miss Vandenberg was riding west on Grand River with Herbert N. Duckett also of Clarenceville, and was making a left hand turn onto the Eight Mile road when a car approaching from the west on Grand River, driven by Irving R. Kirkland, 20 12174 Cherrylawn avenue, Detroit collided with the car in which Miss Vandenberg was riding.

Kirkland was slightly injured but the four other passengers in his car escaped unscathed as did Duckett.

Miss Vandenberg was taken to the hospital by Mrs. Luda Satterfield of Clarenceville, who lives only a few doors from Miss Vandenberg. Miss Satterfield did not learn the girl's identity until arrival at the hospital.

Upon recognizing her, Mrs. Satterfield was near collapse and stated that if she had known who the girl was she never could have driven her to the hospital.
