ASSETS OF BUILDING AND LOAN ASSOCIATION GAIN

Lansing, Mich., Oct. 1.—Despite economic conditions of the past year, assets of building and loan associations in Michigan have shown a substantial gain. Department of State records show. At the present time, associations in the state, have total assets in excess of \$167,000.

A survey of the industry by the building and loan division of the department shows that the associations in the state are in a "good" financial position, according to Coleman C. Vaughan, division chief. In several localities, associations have required members to give 30 days notice to law before withdrawing funds, but investigation by the department shows that this step, in every instance, has been taken as an added protection to members.

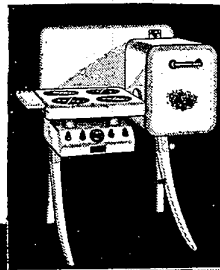

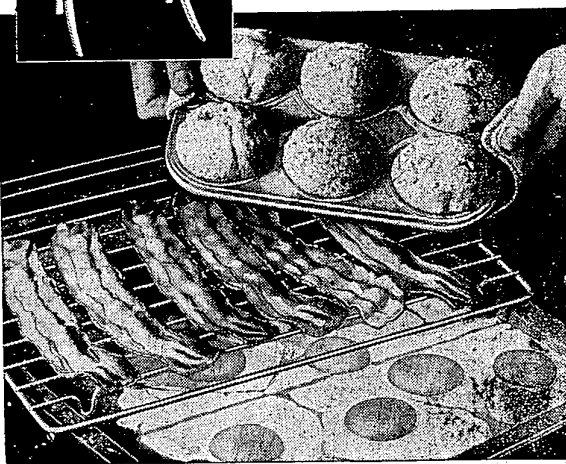
